SIR:—In complance with section twelve of the mining law of this State I herewith submit the fourteenth annual report of the State Inspector of Mines for the Fourth District for the year ending July 1, 1897.

The report gives tabulated statements showing the number of mines in operation, both shipping and local; the number of tons of coal mined, number of accidents fatal and non-fatal; number of miners employed and the number of all other employés in and about mines; the number of kegs of powder used; number of tons of coal produced to each accident, both fatal and non-fatal; the aggregate value of all coal mined and the average price paid for mining.
