FATAL ACCIDENTS

January 6, Bivian Duncan, trip-rider, age 22 years, single, was crushed between pit-cars, in Chicago, Wilmington and Franklin Coal Company's No. 2 mine, causing his death one hour later.

January 9, an explosion of gas occurred in Industrial Coal Company's No. 18 mine (now Peabody Coal Company's No. 18) causing the death of twenty-one men. The following table gives the name, occupation and dependents of the men killed:

January 17, Ben Whited, night boss, age 39 years, married, died from injuries received the day previous in Valier Coal Company's mine. Deceased was caught between two motors and had one leg cut off and the other one badly injured. He leaves a widow.

February 15, Arthur Hughes, motorman, age 28 years, married, died from injuries received two days previous in Old Ben Coal Corporation's No. 8 mine. Deceased was preparing to take out a trip of loads, and as he was walking along the side of the trip counting the loads, a fall of coal from the face knocked out a prop, which struck him on the head, fracturing his skull. He leaves a widow and two children.

March 2, Max Sheruba, miner, age 41 years, was killed in Old Ben Coal Corporation's No. 14 mine. Deceased was walking along the haulage road and stopped in cross-cut to let a trip of loaded cars pass. The trip had come uncoupled, and not noticing it, when the motor and four cars had passed, he resumed his walk on the track, was run down by the other cars and almost instantly killed. He leaves a widow and six children.

March 3, John Shiver, miner, age 52 years, married, died from injuries produced by a fall of rock the day previous in Old Ben Coal Corporation's No. 8 mine. He leaves a widow and four children.

March 6, Joseph Taggert, machine runner, age 41 years, married, was killed in Old Ben Coal Corporation's No. 8 mine, when caught against machine frame by a large lump of coal falling from roof. He leaves a widow and three children.

March 22, George Bennett, miner, age 57 years, married, was instantly killed by a fall of coal in Franklin County Coal Company's No. 5 mine. He leaves a widow.

March 28, Mark Enrico, laborer, age 26 years, married, was caught between two pit-cars and instantly killed, in Franklin County Coal Company's No. 7 mine. He leaves a widow.

April 22, Silas Whittington, timberman, age 40 years, married, was killed in Chicago, Wilmington & Franklin Coal Company's No. 2 mine by a fall of rock. He leaves a widow and two children.

June 8, S. R. Peterson, blacksmith, age 57 years, married, was killed in Chicago, Wilmington & Franklin Coal Company's No. 2 mine. Deceased was helping to repair the cage in the tip-
